

NAPLAN online update - Our Years 3, 5 and 7 students completed NAPLAN online this year. We had only a few very minor issues that were quickly resolved. Our students agreed that the online format was more efficient and easier to use than the old pencil and paper version. The online format allows students to flag questions to come back to if unsure of the answer and makes it easy for them to check that they have answered all questions before submitting their tests. I have included a diagram to explain the way the tests are targeted to students' achievement levels and response styles. With the content coverage across the three testlets combined to form one test, each student is assessed at a similar level of domain breadth regardless of the test pathway taken.

Public schools are outperforming private schools with less funds

Private schools may be dumbing down Australia's international PISA ranking, while public schools outperform them with less money, an education expert has said.

Southern Cross University's Adjunct Associate Professor David Zyngier made the claim after analysing MySchool data and the Victorian Certificate of Education results between 2014 and 2018.

He found public schools had "similar, or even better, VCE results than private schools with similar rankings of socioeconomic status". "And these public schools achieve the results with far less funding per student," Zyngier, a former public school teacher, principal and Monash University academic in education, said.
